As bishop of the Greater Northwest Area of The United Methodist Church, I am extending the suspension of in-person worship in United Methodist Churches and other ministries and the closure of church facilities to all but essential services throughout the Alaska, Oregon-Idaho and Pacific Northwest Conferences through May 30, 2020, until and unless state government and health officials lift restrictions based upon their published criteria for re-opening. This date may be reconsidered as circumstances change.

I promise to try and keep it fun and surprising as well as serious and thought-provoking. I pray that God would use our services to speak to each of you with truth and power.

Diane found a FB post the other day that intrigued me, she wanted to share it with you all, but when I read it, I pocketed it, lol. I thought it might be a great starter for my article in the flash for May, plus it deserves to go a little deeper than it was. So, here it goes...words used from Facebook are in bold.

The Latin root of the word "quarantine" is "forty".

We know that there are several instances where 40 is used... **The flood lasted 40 days. 40 years Moses fled Egypt.**

40 days Moses stayed on Mount Sinai/10 Commandments. Exodus lasted 40 years. Jesus fasted for 40 days. Lent is 40 days.

A group of theologians thinks the number 40 represents "change". It is the time of preparing a person, or people, to make a fundamental change.

I thought that the number forty meant until it was finished, for whatever it was that was happening at the time, but I never thought about adding the word "change" to the equation. But it really does seem to fit very well, there was a definite change component involved when we see the number forty used. Interesting, kind of makes you look at that number forty a little different. So, I was thinking about other numbers we can find in the Bible, especially in the prophetic books of Daniel and Revelation. Of course, let us remember that most Bible scholars agree that while some of the numbers might possess literal significance, others are used more for symbolic purposes. So, let us not get too carried away with them. Our list is not exhaustive but simply an example of numbers used in the Bible.

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One

The number one denotes absolute singleness.

"Hear, O Israel: The Lord our God, the Lord is one." (Deut. 6:4, ESV)

Two

The number two symbolizes witness and support.

Two witnesses establish truth (Matthew 26:60).

The disciples were sent two by two (Luke 10:1).

Three

The number three signifies completion or perfection, and unity. Three is the number of Persons in the Trinity.

Jesus answered them, "Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up." (John 2:19, ESV) Jonah spent 3 days and 3 nights in the belly of the fish (Matt. 12:40). Jesus' earthly ministry lasted three years (Luke 13:7).

Four

The number four relates to the earth.

Earth has four seasons: winter, spring, summer, and fall.

There are four primary directions: north, south, east, and west.

There are four earthly kingdoms (Daniel 7:3).

Jesus' parable had four types of soil (Matthew 13).

Five

Five is a number associated with grace.

There are five Levitical offerings (Leviticus 1-5).

Jesus multiplied five loaves of bread to feed 5,000 (Matthew 14:17).

Six

Six is the number of men.

Adam and Eve were created on the sixth day (Genesis 1:31).

Seven

Seven refers to the number of God, divine perfection, or completeness.

When you buy a Hebrew slave, he shall serve six years, and in the seventh, he shall go out free, for nothing. (Exodus 21:2, ESV)

On the seventh day, God rested after completing the creation (Genesis 2:2).

God's Word is pure, like silver purified seven times in the fire (Psalm 12:6).

Jesus taught Peter to forgive 70 times seven (Matthew 18:22).

Seven demons went out from Mary Magdalene, symbolizing total deliverance (Luke 8:2).

Ten

The number ten relates to human governments and law.

And he [Boaz] took ten men of the elders of the city [as judges] and said, "Sit down here." So they sat down. (Ruth 4:2, ESV)

The Ten Commandments were the Tablets of the Law (Exodus 20:1-17, Deuteronomy 5:6-21).

Ten tribes made up the northern kingdom (1 Kings 11:31-35).

Twelve

The number twelve relates to divine government, God's authority, perfection, and completeness.

It [the New Jerusalem] had a great, high wall, with twelve gates, and at the gates twelve angels, and on the gates, the names of the twelve tribes of the sons of Israel were inscribed -- on the east three gates, on the north three gates, on the south three gates, and on the west three gates. And the wall of the city had twelve foundations, and on them were the twelve names of the twelve apostles of the Lamb. (Revelation 21:12-14, ESV)

There were 12 Tribes of Israel (Revelation 7).

Jesus chose 12 apostles (Matthew 10:2-4).

Thirty

Thirty is a time frame and number associated with mourning and sorrow.

Aaron's death was mourned for 30 days (Numbers 20:29).

Moses' death was mourned for 30 days (Deuteronomy 34:8).

Forty

Forty is a number associated with testing and trials.

And Moses was on the mountain forty days and forty nights. (Exodus 24:18, ESV)

During the flood, it rained for 40 days (Genesis 7:4).

Israel wandered in the desert for 40 years (Numbers 14:33).

Jesus was in the wilderness 40 days before being tempted (Matthew 4:2).

Fifty

The number fifty holds significance in feasts, celebrations, and ceremonies.

And you shall consecrate the fiftieth year and proclaim liberty throughout the land to all its inhabitants. It shall be a jubilee for you when each of you shall return to his property and each of you shall return to his clan. (Leviticus 25:10, ESV)

The Feast of Pentecost was celebrated on the fiftieth day after Passover (Leviticus 23:15-16).

Fifty days after Jesus Christ's resurrection the Holy Spirit-filled believers on the Day of Pentecost (Acts 2).

666

666 is the number of the beast.

The number or mark of the beast is the sign of the Antichrist (Revelation 13:15-18).

And looking at life today...our Facebook writer writes...

Remember we are in the year 2020, and 20 + 20 = 40.

I must ask the question. Are we going through a time of testing or trials?

Also, 2020 is the year of the United States Census. Jesus Christ, the savior of the world, was born during a census.

Scholars remain cautious about assigning too much importance to the meaning of numbers in the Bible. Such usage has led some groups to believe numbers can reveal the future or uncover hidden information. That is dangerous territory and can't lead to anything good.

Lastly, 2020 is a perfect vision.

She also wrote a beautiful prayer to fit her theme...

May our sight focus on the Lord and living according to His perfect vision for us knowing He holds us in the palm of His hand.

May these days of "quarantine" bring spiritual liberation to our souls, our nation, and our world. The best is yet to come.
